### ABA president: End judicial elections

Birmingham lawyer and American Bar Association President Tommy Wells blasted judicial elections Wednesday, saying they amount to little more than at tempts at influence peddling.

Wells, a partner at Maynard Cooper & Gale, said free-for all Alabama judicial elections should be abolished and replaced with publicly funded nonpartisan races or appoint ment via a governor's exec utive panel.


Wells told the Downtown Rotary Club the November election for the vacant Alabama Supreme Court seat cost \$5 million in all.

"It was the most expensive supreme court election in the country," Wells said: "The amount of money that was spent was obscene, and amounted to more than is spent in the whole state for le gal services for the poor."

Wells took office in August and said leading the 410,000 members of the bar requires a lot of travel. He said he has been on the road 47 of the 77 days so far this year. Russell Hubbard

Sir:

I am writing you at this defining moment in American history to draw your attention to the concern of my family and of millions of Iraqi citizens over the prolonged unlawful detention of my father Tariq Aziz.

As you know, my father was the Foreign Minister and Deputy Prime Minister of Iraq. In that quality, he was **responsible for crafting Iraq's foreign policy** and always fought for the progressive, centrist ideals he believed in at a time when most of the developing world was aggressively polarized into opposing "blocs". It is precisely because of his dedication to moderate and secular ideals, that **Tariq Aziz was repeatedly targeted by members of the Islamic Dawa Party: in April 1980, he survived an assassination attempt carried out in central Baghdad by Dawa Party militants** trained and armed by the Iranian government.

For all his time in government, Tariq Aziz served exclusively as chief diplomat, rising to the rank of Deputy Prime Minister in charge of supervising his country's foreign policy and public diplomacy efforts. Throughout his career, Tariq Aziz has constantly sought to build bridges between the Arabic-Islamic world and the West, rejecting the Manichean view of "clash of civilizations".

As mentioned earlier, Tariq Aziz was Deputy Prime Minister in charge of foreign policy at the time of the US invasion of Iraq in March 2003. Throughout his career in government that spans 31 years, Tariq Aziz served solely in the fields of foreign policy and information/public diplomacy: he never held any government position related to domestic policy, defense or state security. In other words, he never was in a position to indict, let alone convict and arrest, anyone inside or outside his country.

After US troops completed their illegal occupation of Iraq in April 2003, President Bush chose to dismantle the country's civilian government structure and issued a "list of most-wanted Iraqis" lumping together senior civil servants such as Tariq Aziz, as well as military officers and members of President Saddam Hussein's extended family... Tariq Aziz surrendered to American forces on April 24<sup>th</sup> 2003, thus becoming a *de facto* prisoner of war: he has remained in detention since then.

Until April 2008, no charges were brought against him, in clear breach of international and US laws- notably the Sixth Amendment to the United States Constitution which makes explicit "the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury"... Things got worse on April 29, 2008, when after 5 years of imprisonment, Tariq Aziz was suddenly charged by the Iraqi government for the execution of 40 merchants back in 1992.

Beyond the vacuity of these accusations based on doctored documents and false testimonies, we have reasons to believe that the hastily arranged trial of Tariq Aziz will be a travesty: in essence, this illegal trial coming after more than 5 years of illegal detention is just a judicial tool used by Dawa Party militants to continue their attempt on the life of Tariq Aziz.

Today, more than half of the members of Iraq's government are members or former members the Islamic Dawa Party: in fact Iranian-trained Dawa militants are present at all levels of government, notably at the Ministry of Justice and in courts of law across the country- with the notable exception of the northern Mosul district and Kurdistan, most of Iraq's Arabic-speaking judges and jury nominees selected by the government are now likely to be staunch Dawa members or sympathizers....

In these circumstances how can my father expect to be judged fairly? If, in the framework of the recently adopted U.S.-Iraq Status of Forces Agreement, Tariq Aziz is delivered to the Iraqi government in the coming weeks, then this will amount to cold-blooded murder.

In addition to that my father, a 73 year-old man, suffers from a number of critical illnesses. He had suffered a stroke before the invasion of Iraq for which he was hospitalized several times. One of our main concerns is the quality of the healthcare he receives in the detention centre, as man in his old age and medical condition needs constant, advanced medical care, one which, to our knowledge, is not available at the detention centre in Camp Cropper.

Today, as Tariq Aziz sits in jail in **Camp Cropper**, a de facto US territory, while Iraq is descending further into sectarian violence, his family and his friends are asking you to help in his release. We know your dedication to justice and progressive ideals and we're certain your help can make a real difference: at a time when President Obama has started to reverse some of the wrongful policies pursued by the previous administration, I am confident that my father's cause won't have a better advocate.
