Independence—both independence of the bar and independence of the judiciary—is a common core value of the legal profession, a value we all share. And, as such, it has been a primary focus of my ABA presidency.

Earlier this month, the ABA's National Summit on Fair and Impartial State Courts in Charlotte, North Carolina, helped us strategize on garnering support for independent state judiciaries and justice systems, especially during the economic crisis. I am happy to see so many of you who joined us or otherwise supported our efforts at the Summit, and I assure you that our activity has only begun.

The National Center for State Courts has been a valuable partner in our efforts to produce the Summit and sustain our efforts. Chief Justice Margaret Marshall, the chair of the National Center and the President of the Conference of Chief Justices, will address you in a few moments. Justice Marshall spoke eloquently at the Summit, referring to the robust collaboration between the ABA, the National Center, and the Conference of Chiefs.

Today's program is further evidence of the strength and importance of the relationship between us. Like our summit on fair and impartial state courts, our discussion very much involves you as leaders of your state judiciaries. Today's topic goes a step further, as 21st century realities impact your supreme courts as regulators of lawyers and law firms.

Clients of all types crisscross the U.S. and the world in the conduct of their business.

Their legal needs do not recognize borders.

More and more U.S. lawyers and firms practice abroad.

In addition, we have seen a significant increase in the number of non-U.S. lawyers and firms here in the States. They hire our lawyers, and we hire theirs. Law firms worldwide face ever increasing economic pressures.

Other countries have recently responded by changing their rules that govern the practice of law. Australia, Canada, and England and Wales permit lawyers to practice in partnerships with non-lawyers and in business structures that provide legal and other services. Australia now has publicly traded law firms. Other countries are contemplating similar changes. Over the decades the ABA and the Conference have considered these issues in groups such as the Commission on Multidisciplinary Practice.

We are here today to learn more about these developments. And in doing so, we must be responsive to change without diluting the core values of our profession that ensure ethical conduct and accountability.

INTRODUCE JUSTICE MARSHALL:

The Honorable Margaret H. Marshall is the Chief Justice of the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court.

A native of South Africa, she graduated from Witwaterstrand University in Johannesburg in 1966. In 1966, she was elected as President of the National Union of South African Students, and served in that capacity until 1968 when she came to the United States to pursue her graduate studies.

She received a master's degree from Harvard University, and her J.D. from Yale Law School.

Chief Justice Marshall was an associate, and later a partner, in the Boston law firm of Csapler & Bok, and was a partner in the Boston law firm of Choate, Hall & Stewart.

Before her appointment to the Supreme Judicial Court, Justice Marshall was Vice President and General Counsel of Harvard University. First appointed as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court in November 1996, she was named as Chief Justice in September 1999, and began her term in October.

Chief Justice Marshall is the second woman to serve on the Supreme Judicial Court in its over-300 year history, and the first woman to serve as Chief Justice.
